After all, a photographic report can also manipulate viewers by, for example, displaying just one sort of attitude presented on a given day. Because I do not believe in taking a one-sided approach, this series of images depicts the reality as I saw it and captured it: white, black, and everything in between. It was simply the way things were out there.

I am delighted that, on this day, individuals representing often diametrically opposed worldviews, religions, and so on, peacefully gathered together. There were no acts of aggression this year, unlike prior years, however, I did spot and picture burning flares and masked individuals. At the same moment, in the same March, children, veterans (some in wheelchairs), Poles, and people of different nationalities and skin colors walked hand in hand. And this, in my opinion, is patriotism and Independence Day celebration.


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






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AUTHOR BIOGRAPHIES

As a photographer and art animator affiliated with the Nova Ars Poloniae Foundation (www.novaars.org), I use the pseudonym Radek von Hirschberg. I participate in a variety of creative activities, and my passion for experimenting allows me to push the boundaries of photography as well. I returned to this hobby after a thirty-year break, mixing it with freelance work.

My interest in photographing mountains and landscapes stems from my background and upbringing in the Giant Mountains. Natural light is something I adore. I mostly photograph in a creative manner, telling stories about how I see reality or constructing undiscovered narratives through what is in the frames. I do not only photograph landscapes; human beings also feature in my photographs, resulting in interesting portraits. Because the camera is an indispensable element of my daily life, I use it in my job to do street photography and reportage.

Almost everyone nowadays owns a camera and, in terms of technical ability, can take decent photographs. What matters to me is being able to express myself through photography in a specific place and time. Sometimes there is more profound content in it, and sometimes it is mostly about form.

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
